the most comprehensive study of violence against u s journalists from the american revolution to the present this text takes an innovative approach to free speech issues tracing violence against the press throughout american history to discuss the changing structures and cultures of the media and emphasizing that struggles over the media from colonial printers to salman rushdie are really contests over the public sphere

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many books have shown that journalists have political power but none have offered a more wide ranging account of how they got it the power of the press is a pioneering look at the birth of political journalism before the american revolution thomas leonard notes the press in the colonies was a timid enterprise poorly protected by law and shy of government newspapers helped make the revolution but they were not fully aware of the way they could fit into a democracy it was only in the nineteenth century that journalists learned to tell the stories and supply the pictures that made politics a national preoccupation leonard traces the rise of political reporting through some fascinating corridors of american history the exposes of the revolutionary era the unfeeling accuracy of congressional reporting the role of the new york times and harper s weekly in attacking new york city s infamous tweed ring and the emergence of muckraking at the beginning of our century the increasing power of the press in the political arena has been a double edged sword leonard argues he shows that while political reporting nurtured the broad interest in politics that made democracy possible this journalism became a threat to political participation

in 1964 the supreme court handed down a landmark decision in *New York Times v. Sullivan* guaranteeing constitutional protection for caustic criticism of public officials thus forging the modern law of freedom of the press since then the court has decided case after case affecting the rights and restrictions of the press yet little has been written about these developments as they pertain to the fourth estate. Lucas Powe's essential book now fills this gap. Lucas A. Powe Jr. a legal scholar specializing in media and the law goes back to the framing of the first amendment and chronicles the two main traditions of interpreting freedom of the press to illuminate the issues that today ignite controversy. How can a balance be achieved among reputation, uninhibited discussion and media power? Under what circumstance can the government seek to protect national security by enjoining the press rather than attempting the difficult task of convincing a jury that publication was a criminal offense? What rights can the press properly claim to protect confidential sources or to demand access to information otherwise barred to the public? And as the media grow larger and larger can the government attempt to limit their power by limiting their size? Writing for the concerned layperson and student of both journalism and jurisprudence, Powe synthesizes law, history and theory to explain and justify full protection of the editorial choices of the press. The fourth estate and the constitution not only captures the sweep of history of supreme court decisions on the press but also provides a timely restatement of the traditional view of freedom of the press at a time when liberty is increasingly called into question.

At the beginning of the 1970s broadcast news and a few newspapers such as the *New York Times* wielded national influence in shaping public discourse to a degree never before enjoyed by the news media. At the same time, however, attacks from political conservatives such as Vice President Spiro Agnew began to erode public trust in news institutions. Even as a new breed of college educated reporters were hitting their stride, this new wave of journalists doing their best to cover the roiling culture wars of the day grew increasingly frustrated by the limitations of traditional notions of objectivity in news writing and began to push back against convention, turning their eyes on the press itself. Two of these new journalists, a Pulitzer Prize winning Harvard educated *New York Times* reporter named J. Anthony Lukas and a former *Newsweek* media writer named Richard Pollak, founded a journalism review called *More* in 1971 with its pilot issue appearing the same month that the *Times* began publishing the Pentagon Papers. *More* covered the press with a critical attitude that blended seriousness and satire. Part *New York Review of Books*, part underground press, in the eight years that it published, *More* brought together nearly every important American journalist of the 1970s either as a writer, a subject of its critical eye or as a participant in its series of raucous, a.k.a. "J. Liebling Counter-Conventions" meetings named after the outspoken press critic, the first of which convened in 1974. Issue after issue, the magazine considered and questioned the mainstream press's coverage of explosive stories of the decade including the Watergate scandal, the seven dirty words obscenity trial, the debate over a reporter's constitutional privilege, the rise of public broadcasting, the struggle for women and minorities to find a voice in mainstream newsrooms and the U.S. debut of press baron Rupert Murdoch. In telling the story of *More* and its legacy, Kevin Lerner explores the power of criticism to reform and guide the institutions of the press and in turn influence public discourse.

Long ago dubbed the fourth branch of government, the American press remains to most of the general public an inscrutable enterprise whose influence and behavior are alternately welcomed and maligned. Yet the proper functioning of a democracy depends upon a media-literate populace to act as the ultimate watchdog with wit and authority. John Hamilton and George Krinsky lead readers through the whirl of print journalism; they offer a curiosity-satisfying blend of explanation and interpretation, history, anecdotes aplenty and statistical analysis to show what's wrong and what works with today's newspapers.
